## Attendance and Punctuality

As I am sure you are all aware, attendance and punctuality is very important, and as such it is monitored closely. Fortnightly, we will be sending attendance and punctuality information to parents via studybugs.

Last week the Attendance and Inclusion Officer for West Kent came in to monitor attendance at Frittenden: there are follow up meetings planned. They will be looking at how to support the school and improve attendance as well as making recommendations for referrals to County for attendance when it does not significantly improve.

Please take a minute to read through the school statistics and what they mean in terms of impact to the school and children's learning.

## Whole School Attendance at Frittenden:

Good attendance is identified as over $95 \%$. As you can see from the table above, just under half the children at Frittenden have good attendance.

Pupils deemed persistently absent are those with attendance of less than $90 \%$. Currently, just over a quarter of the school are persistently absent.
$\mathbf{9 5 \%}$ attendance for the year equals $\mathbf{1 0}$ days that your child has been absent, that is $\mathbf{2}$ full weeks of learning missed that year.
$\mathbf{9 0 \%}$ attendance for the year equals 19 days that your child has been absent, that is almost 4 weeks of learning missed that year.
$\mathbf{8 5 \%}$ attendance for the year equals 29 days absence, which is almost $\mathbf{6}$ weeks of learning missed that year (half a term!).
$\mathbf{8 0 \%}$ attendance for the year equals $\mathbf{3 8}$ days that your child has been absent, that is over $\mathbf{7}$ weeks of learning missed that year.

91\% attendance over term 1 and 2 is below the national average of $94 \%$.

Punctuality is a life skill.

This table shows the number of minutes learning lost to lateness over terms $1 \& 2.1909$ minutes is almost $\mathbf{3 2}$ hours of learning.

Good school attendance includes being there on time. The habit of good punctuality at school will help your child throughout their education and into adult life and the work place.

5 minutes late each day $=3$ days lost over a year
10 minutes late each day $=6.5$ days lost over a year
15 minutes late each day $=10$ days lost over a year
20 minutes late each day $=13$ days lost over a year
30 minutes late each day $=19$ days lost over a year

Why is lateness such a bad thing? Every minute of every day counts.
Persistent lateness, after the register closes, can result in prosecution under Section 444 of the 1996 Education Act

## Being Late:

- Gets your child's day off to a bad start
- Can be embarrassing for your child
- Will be noticed by other children who may make negative comments
- May lead to your child losing confidence
- Disrupts the lesson for everyone
- Can cause your child to fall behind with their work
- Creates a bad habit that can be hard to break
